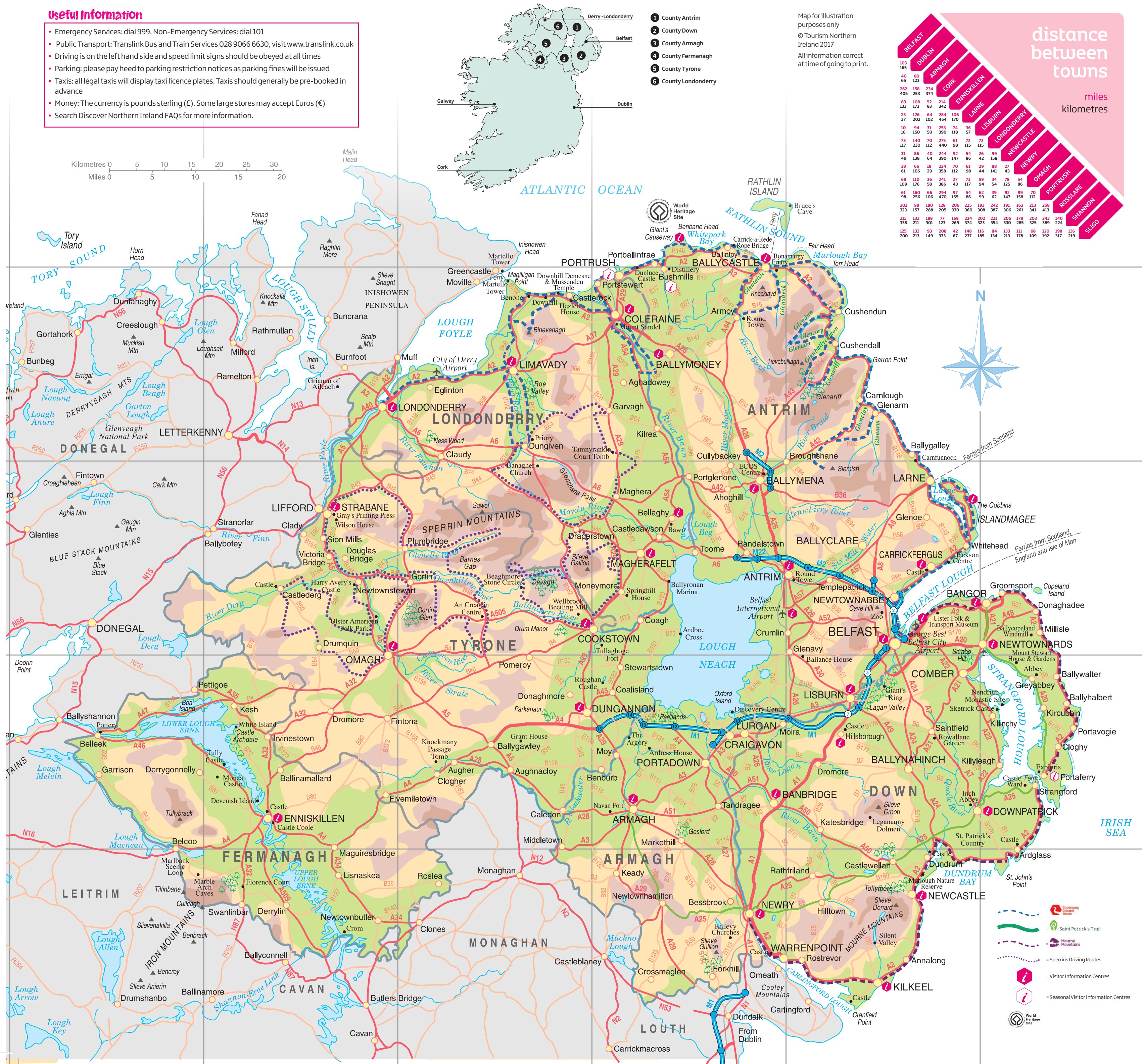

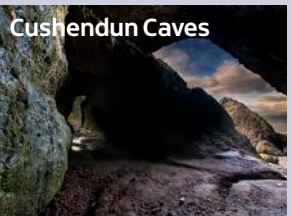

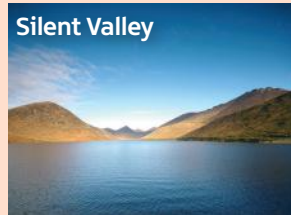

TOP driving tips

We take the safety of our visitors seriously - here are some driving tips you need to be aware of.



Drive on the left.



Merging drivers must prepare to stop if necessary.



At roundabouts, you must give way to traffic from your right. You must travel around the roundabout in a clockwise direction.



When crossing the border from The Republic of Ireland into Northern Ireland the speed limit and signage changes from kilometres per hour (KPH) to miles per hour (MPH). Please exercise caution and adjust your speed accordingly.
