



Dublin's many pubs vary in character and clientele. If it is atmosphere and nostalgia for Dublin's past that beckons, there are an exclusive few that have survived revolution and reconstruction, and remain a window into bygone days. Although many of Dublin's oldest watering holes predate the Victorian era, it was the excesses of the Victorian Design Movement that have left their mark on some



of Dublin's most famous pubs. Characterized by wood panelling, elaborate carvings and unique original features in glass, brass and more, each pub has its own history at resonates with the city's own. 
