



Mountsandel

(Mountsandel Road, Coleraine) one of the world's top links courses dating to between 7600 and 7900BC. Flint tools were found here, indicating that Stone Age hunters camped here The earthen fort is thought to date back to Norman times. The forest walk leads from the fort down to the banks of the Bann and passes close to the weir at The Cutts. There are good views over Somerset Wood and of the River Bann. Access is free.
